An Honors Guide to the General Education Curriculum* for Students Pursuing the Bachelor of Arts in Arts and Sciences The Ohio State University

(These requirements apply to freshmen entering the university Summer Quarter 2007 or later.)

The Arts and Sciences Honors Committee expects all honors students to develop distinguished curricular programs. Each student's program should reflect a commitment to taking the most challenging possible courses that fit the student's background. This document defines the general standards for rigor in an Arts and Sciences Honors Program, along with basic opportunities for flexibility in pursuing that objective.

1. SKILLS

A. Writing and Related Skills

(1) First Course 5 hours

English 110.01 or 110.02 (honors version recommended)

(2) Second Course 5 hours

Select one course from the following list.

(3) Third Course

Course work is taken as part of the major program, or by successfully completing a senior thesis.

B. Quantitative and Logical Skills

(1) Basic Computational Skills

You must have Mathematics Placement Level R or higher, or complete Mathematics 75.

(2) Mathematical and Logical Analysis

You must complete at least one strong course in this area, and completion of Mathematics 152 is preferred. However, the minimum requirement is completion of Mathematics 150 (or Mathematics 148 and another strong course such as Linguistics 384H or Philosophy 250).

(3) Data Analysis

Complete the course required by your major or recommended by your faculty advisor. If no such course exists, you should complete Statistics 145 or a course from the following list.

C. Foreign Language

Course work or proficiency through the fourth language course (104) is required, and further study is strongly recommended.

2. BREADTH (45 hours)

<u>Note Regarding AP/IB/EM Credit</u>: Up to 10 hours of AP/IB/EM credit may be applied in the breadth areas. AP/IB/EM credit in the breadth areas may only be used to satisfy requirements in the Natural Science and/or Additional Breadth categories.

<u>Note Regarding Diversity of Course Selections</u>: The two courses in the Social Sciences and the two courses in the Arts and Humanities (four courses total) must be chosen from at least three different departments. This requirement may not be fulfilled by AP/IB/EM credit.

A. Natural Science 15 hours (20 hours preferred)

Plan to take the most rigorous course work commensurate with your background and ability, honors courses if appropriate. You are required to take at least one two-course sequence, at least one course in the biological sciences, and at least one course in the physical sciences. At least one of the courses chosen must have a laboratory. Five hours of AP/IB/EM credit may be applied to this requirement.

B. Social Science 10 hours

Appropriate courses include any courses with a social/political/economic emphasis at the 500 level and above (except courses numbered 597) from the departments listed below, as well as the honors courses listed.

D. Additional Breadth Selections 10 hours

In consultation with your advisors, select two additional courses from any of the breadth categories or from the Historical Study category. Up to 10 hours of AP/IB/EM credit may be applied to this requirement.

3. HISTORICAL STUDY (10 hours)

Select two courses. Choose any appropriate 300- or 500level course(s) (except courses numbered 398 or 597) from the Department of History and/or course(s) from the list below. Five hours of AP/IB/EM History credit may be applied to this requirement.

4. DIVERSITY EXPERIENCES

You should plan to overlap these courses with another GEC category or your major. If you do not plan such overlap, the diversity experiences requirement must still be met.

Social Diversity in the United States

As you complete the Natural Science, the Social Science, the Arts and Humanities, and the Historical Study categories (or your major), you are required to include at least one course that provides exposure to issues of social diversity in the United States.

International Issues

As you complete the Natural Science, the Social Science, the Arts and Humanities, and the Historical Study categories (or your major), you are required to include at least two courses that provide exposure to international, global, and non-western society and culture.

5. ISSUES OF THE CONTEMPORARY WORLD

In consultation with your advisor, select one course from the following list, or select a 500- or 600-level course that covers both interdisciplinary concerns and contemporary issues, and also makes connections among the different parts of your curriculum.
